



Delhi Declaration: 86 Nations Just Signed a "Global Handshake" for AI Age

Summary

In a historic move this weekend, 86 countries (including United States and China) came together in New Delhi to sign the "Delhi Declaration on AI Impact." This isn't just another government document; it's a global agreement to make sure AI helps everyone instead of just a few big tech companies. Declaration marks a major shift from focusing only on AI safety to prioritizing AI for everyone.

With major world powers finally on same page, goal is to share AI tools fairly, protect jobs, and ensure that human control remains at heart of every robot and algorithm. For first time, Global South is leading conversation on how world's most powerful technology should be governed.

What It Means

New "Resume" for World's AI

Delhi Declaration is built on Seven Pillars (referred to as "Chakras") that act as shared rulebook for how countries should build and use AI. Most important shift is toward democratizing AI. Instead of AI being concentrated in hands of a few corporations, 86 nations agreed to share research and tools so smaller countries and startups can compete.

Signatories also committed to building energy-efficient AI systems, acknowledging that growing electricity demand from data centers is global challenge requiring coordinated response.

List of participating nations includes United States, China, United Kingdom, Canada, Germany, India,

Russia, and European Union members. This creates voluntary, non-binding framework that even major rivals are willing to endorse.

Agreement places international pressure on AI companies to demonstrate that new systems are human-centric, trustworthy, and aligned with shared global standards.

Another major outcome was \$250 billion in pledged investments for AI infrastructure. Funds are expected to support construction of data centers and semiconductor manufacturing facilities across multiple regions.

By signing declaration, participating nations signaled that AI should be treated as shared global resource, aimed at social empowerment rather than disruption.
